SUBJECT: U.S. Response to UN questionnaire on the Absher App

The United States thanks the Working Group on the Issue of Human Rights and Transnational Corporations and Other Business Enterprises, the Special Rapporteur on the Right to Privacy, the Special Rapporteur on Violence Against Women, its Causes and Consequences, and the Working Group on the Issue of Discrimination Against Women in Law and in Practice for their March 28, 2019 letter to Secretary of State Pompeo about the Absher app. We welcome the opportunity to offer the following comments.

The United States affirms our support for human rights and fundamental freedoms, including the rights to freedom of movement and from arbitrary or unlawful interference with privacy for all individuals, both women and men. We also affirm our commitment to implementation of the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights. Pursuant to this commitment, we regularly engage with U.S. businesses to discuss human rights due diligence and to highlight heightened risks of human rights violations or abuses in various countries and regions. We urge the Government of Saudi Arabia to adhere to and promote these human rights and fundamental freedoms, as well as equal and individual liberties, opportunities, and choices for women and men without distinction, and to refrain from measures that may not only impair enjoyment of human rights, but also severely limit women's economic potential and contributions.
